
Marlyville-Fontainebleau Neighborhood Closures



NEW ORLEANS – Currently, there are seven projects impacting the Marlyville-Fontainebleau area. Due to the amount of work in the area, there has been an increase in road closures across the neighborhood. The City of New Orleans recognizes the quality of life impact these closures can cause and we are working diligently with the contractors to alleviate these inconveniences as quickly as possible. In an effort to improve community awareness around detours through the neighborhood, the Department of Public Works and RoadworkNOLA will be updating a map that illustrates detours in the Marlyville-Fontainebleau area. This map will be updated and publicized every 45 days.

Since May 2018, DPW has completed 164 projects with an estimated value of \$626 million. Today, 54 roadwork projects are under construction with an estimated value of nearly \$659 million.
